RIVER CRUISE UPDATE APRIL 10th 2010



GLOBESPAN FLIGHTS - SERVING SCOTLAND NO MORE

The position of Globespan has been pretty precarious over the last months if not years, but it was the only way of getting our Scottish friends out from the localities of Glasgow and Edinburgh. Sadly, no longer. Globespan went into administration today, 17th December. We had been explaining time and time again to friends on the phone that they had reduced flying days to three a week, taken one airport out completely and it was dangerous to even consider booking even with extra nights added in Barcelona. What we were unaware of, is that Royal Caribbean had been using Globespan flights for their 2010 cruises. We were lucky. We booked no seats on Globespan for the coming year. Now, Scottish friends, you know why. Which leaves a void in the market, because you have no routes whatsoever flying directly to any of the ports in Europe that serve our 4 and 5 star cruise ships other than Jet2 who have added Venice but at extremely high pricing. Maybe they know a thing or two! We know it's a nightmare. It will only get worse and is the same for many areas now in the UK. We believe in making the journey part of your holiday as easy as possible, by at least getting you there the same day on a direct routing and not on a charter. We are monitoring the situation closely and will always report back if there are changes in the market. Which brings us on to......

HOW DO WE GET TO ROME?

Impossible from Scotland, but may be getting a little easier from other airports! Already we have flights supplying access to many cruises from Civitavecchia that go from Gatwick, Stansted, Heathrow, Manchester and Dublin. Liverpool was always on our routings but now flying days have been reduced to three times a week, Monday Thursday and Saturday. This means that, on many dates, you can now stay in Rome pre or post cruise, still dependent on flying days though, enabling you to use the new double decker train service between Rome Central and Civitavecchia and become a bespoke traveller. The same also goes for Bristol flights which leave in the afternoon thus a mandatory stay has to be made in Rome. So, if you want to discuss any cruises that go from Rome, especially Celebrity Equinox or Queen Victoria, you may now want those extra nights in Rome to complete your enjoyment!









A CARIBBEAN ESCAPADE

Antigua, St Lucia, Barbados, Aruba and Curacao. Spiriting us away to within 15 miles of Venezuela, and skirting past Cuba on our way home, we enjoyed a festival of Caribbean cultures. There were sheltered and beautiful pirate bays to excite our imagination, although nothing in comparison to the pirate treasures of the jewels displayed in the ports of call, enticing us to bargain with the shop keepers to bring some of that sparkle back to our dull winter life. Our journey began at Miami. Welcomed aboard with a glass of champagne from a smiling crew member, within minutes we were relaxed and ready for the 'sail away' party. Two days at sea gave us time to see and experience the onboard facilities. First stop St Thomas and a carnival atmosphere as we left the ship to take a trip around the small, beautiful island. The guide was passionate in his desire to show the locations offering stunning photographic views, including Magens Bay, considered one of the top ten beaches of the world. After the trip we sought refuge from the heat in the cool air-conditioned jewellery shops, smiling and nodding to fellow passengers engaged in bartering for a tempting diamond ring or pendant. St Maarten offered



more shopping opportunities after the water taxi took us to the pier. We could easily combine a sightseeing trip, shopping in the main parade, a snooze on the beach sun beds and a dip in the cool waves of the Caribbean Sea. Sheer bliss! Antigua was full of verdant vegetation and we Brits nodded appreciatively as we were shown the new Test Match venue that was so embarrassingly underwater in the 2009 summer series! Nevertheless there was affinity between the islanders and us, both passionate about cricket. Nelson's Dockyard

was a haven of peace and tranquility with beautiful yachts moored in the harbour. We watched enviously as we sipped yet another Pina Colada or Rum Punch, each of us drifting away on our fantasy cruise. Shirley Heights demonstrated the stunning landscape of the island as well as the advantages of such a spot to watch for enemy vessels sailing into the waters. St Lucia was the epitome of a Caribbean island. Roads twisted around high cliffs and mountains were cloaked with the green rain forest. The dense trees and undergrowth became both intriguing and forbidding and was a reminder of the novel 'Lord of The Flies'. Here there was opportunity to take trips to engage with nature whether appreciating the abundance of vegetation from an aerial canopy or snorkeling in the clear waters. The volcano bubbled with sulphur and as we walked into the crater we were pleased to recognise the smell of rotten eggs, indicative of the safe level of gasses. We then went to a waterfall cascading into a pool where we were permitted to bathe in a style reminiscent of the Bounty TV ads. Barbados offered contrasting beauty from the developed tourist areas, ranging from grand hotels and white beaches edging the Caribbean Sea, to the aptly named 'Little Scotland' on the Atlantic coast which was more rugged and dramatic. The waves rolled rhythmically onto guiet beaches between rocky peninsulas. Tourists are advised to avoid the lethal currents here and it has become an area popular for the natives of Barbados to seek refuge from the high energy lifestyle of the Caribbean coast. After a day's sea rest, Constellation moored at Oranjestad in Aruba, a different island, barren and flat, reminiscent of films like 'Rio Grande' or 'The Magnificent Seven'. Rocks and boulders litter the landscape and vegetation is mainly cacti. As with every other island, the fine hotels and luscious golf courses contrasted with the rock formations to give an uncanny feel. The pretty, colourful main town was a reminder of the Dutch influence. Curacao, the final island, was a delight. To reach it you could walk over the pontoon bridge or take a ferry. Cafes line the water side and in the heat of a November day, many enjoyed watching the harbour activities as well as enjoy a refreshing drink. And, of course, there was the final opportunity for shopping. After two more sea days it was back to Miami and saying our farewells to fellow passengers. Each of us had independent arrangements before our night flight home. Some sought the sanctuary of a hotel, while others toured Miami or experienced the wilderness of the Everglades. Back home, in the cold and damp, sitting looking at photographs beside a roaring fire, we wonder if it was all real or was it just a Caribbean dream?" Sue Daniel
